


1. ADAMS, RAMON F. **THE OLD-TIME COWHAND.** New York: The MacMillan Co., 1961. First edition. 8vo. Limited to 350 copies signed by the author and the illustrator. This is copy 90. Pictorial cloth, dark gray endpapers, x, 354 pp., top edges gilt, illustrated by Nick Eggenhofer, afterword. This work is one of Adam's best, an excellent account of the true cowboy. "The most complete, accurate and personal history of the old-time cowboy I have ever read in one volume."---Max Evans. Six Guns 12 says "Has a chapter on cattle rustlers and one on outlaws." Offers a description of a cowhand's cow-punching, bronco-busting, trail driving; his rodeo riding, poker playing, socializing; his horse, guns, rope, clothing, sleeping bag; his eating and drinking habits; his attitude toward God, women, bosses; as well as his unwritten code of conduct. 2. [ALASKA] [CRIME]. THE NOME, ALASKA NEWS. **A MURDEROUS KNIFE WIELDED.** Nome: The Nome News, 1901. First edition. 15" x 22" newsprint, 4 pp., printed in six columns. The newspaper is printed semi-weekly and this issue is dated August 17, 1901. This newspaper is quite content-rich compared to most small papers of the era, with considerable space devoted to local news content. Problems of violence and frontier justice dominate this issue. A large headline on the front page blares "**A Murderous Knife Wielded**" and describes a fight over a woman in which one man's head was nearly severed. Another lengthy story reports that a gang of 65 masked men attacked a camp on Glacier Creek at three o'clock in the morning--leading to thirteen arrests and one man hospitalized with a gunshot wound--all the result of a disputed mining claim (the history of the dispute is recounted in the article). A separate editorial reacts to these events with a call for martial law at the camp, concluding "A man may kill another in the heat of passion for principle and be justified, but the man who deliberately plans to jeopardize life for gold over which there is a clouded title is a murderer to all intents and purposes and deserves the fate of a murderer." Another article reports that Judge James Wickersham spent a day in Nome on his way to Unalaska, where he will preside over two murder trials, and that he is concerned about finding enough competent jurors. And yet another reports that 54 members of the Nome Bar Association have sent a signed petition to President McKinley requesting that he remove District Judge Arthur H. Noyes on the grounds that he "is vacillating and dilatory, weak and partial, negligent, careless, and absolutely incompetent" and that "the interposition of a fearless, honest, and competent judge is urgently required at Nome to prevent further riot and bloodshed, to preserve law and order, and to protect life, liberty, and property." The story of yet another gold-related

murder appears on the paper's last page, where we also find the usual classified and display advertising. Several creases from folding and a small area of loss at the center shaped like a small triangle that affects all pages and measures 1/2" x 1/2" x 1." Good, clean copy. **\$325.00**

The beautiful, color map unfolds to approximately 25" x 29" and provides information on the gold and coal fields of Alaska together with the principal steamer routes and trails. **The map is in fine, unused condition.** The introduction provides a brief history of Alaska plus detailed information is provided regarding rivers, climatic conditions, and routes to Klondike. Additionally information is provided on the physical description of Alaska including original deposits, or quartz veins, placer deposits, probable extent of gold-bearing deposits, coal and lignite, and other metals than gold. This report was prepared in accordance with Public Resolution No. 3 of the Fifty-Fifth Congress, Second Session, and approved January 20, 1898. 4. [ALASKA]. HEALY, U.S.R.M., CAPT. M.A. [COMMANDER]. **REPORT OF THE CRUISE OF THE REVENUE MARINE STEAMER CORWIN IN THE ARCTIC OCEAN IN THE YEAR 1885.** Washington: Government Printing Office, 1887. First edition. Quarto. Original brown cloth, titles stamped in gold gilt on the front cover, 102 pp., illustrated, plates, maps. There are two large folding maps, one a map of the Koowak River, and the other a map of the Noatak River and each map is in fine condition.. There are four chromolithograph plates (one bird, one plant, two fish) and thirty-eight black & white plates many of an ethnographic nature. Healy (1839-1904) patrolled the 20,000 miles of Alaskan coastline for more than 20 years, earning great respect from the natives and seafarers alike. While at the helm of the CORWIN, he enforced liquor laws, protected seal and whale populations under treaty, delivered supplies and medical assistance to remote native villages and shipwrecked whalers, returned deserters to merchant ships, collected weather data, enforced federal laws, and accomplished exploration work. In addition to Healy's narrative, this volume includes shorter accounts by expedition members who were sent to complete the survey of the Koowak River (J. C. Cantrell) and explore the Noatak River (S. B. McLenegan). C. H. Townsend

Harry Wheeler was one of the most dedicated, controversial, and lethal peace officers ever to serve Arizona. He was the only member of the Arizona Rangers to hold every rank in that notable company. He won election three times as sheriff of Cochise County; he also served on the Douglas police force and as a mounted customs officer. Wheeler was driven by a powerful sense of duty and an inner need for public service. An extraordinary marksman with pistol or rifle, he employed his skills with firearms on the side of law and order, wearing one badge after another throughout his career. During his time of service, encountered several incidences, some dangerous, some light-hearted that he offers here

to include stories about Pearl Starr. Rosie Lee Reed, better known as Pearl Starr, was an American bordello owner and businesswoman in Arkansas, the first child of Belle Starr, the reputed "Bandit Queen" of the American Old West, and Jim Reed, Belle's first husband. True stories dealing with thefts, shootings, gambling, whiskey, robberies, judges, call-girls, etc. Also has some material on Henry Starr. Soiling to wrappers and first few pages as well as some damp staining to those pages whereas one of those pages (page 4) text is impacted but still legible. Hand-written corrections and annotations by author throughout the booklet with the following four lines typed and taped at the end of tall text, "David, Lockhart, Lee Sutton and Henry Starr was robbing the bank at Harrison, Arkansas, when Henry Starr was killed. This information was given me by Frank Carlton." Six Guns 848 says, "This book tells about Pearl, Belle's daughter, running a house "on the line" and has some material about Henry Star." The numerous articles provide much information about the mines, mining towns, resources, railways, agricultural resources, ranching, etc. Spine panel has old cellophane tape residue, but professionally restored at spine panel, closed tear to top edge of rear panel has been internally reinforced. and overall a tight, clean very good copy of a scarce item, housed in a slipcase with titles on spine panel. Some actual brands are shown as drawn and others are described. Some writing on the covers mentions Sun Flower County, Mississippi. Perhaps there were ranchers in the vicinity. This is the first and only manuscript brand book we have seen or heard about for Mississippi, or even a printed version. Not listed in Adams' Rampaging Herd. We feel this is a very rare brand book. Original blue cover paper is chipped, else a very good copy, housed in a cloth clamshell case with leather label on the spine and titles stamped in gilt. **\$7500.00**

Stout was at Winter Quarters on the Missouri from Fall of 1846 to Spring of 1848. He includes in his

diary a rare account of the happenings there. Stout went overland to Utah in 1848. Later, although lacking any previous experience in law, he was named 'Staes Attorney.' His diary therefore contains not only views of the people but also a close look at early Utah politics." Will be regarded as a major contribution to Mormon history. A nice set. **\$250.00**

This work was chosen by Jeff Dykes to be one of the "One Hundred Head Cut Out Of The Jeff Dykes Herd" in 1972, in which his description was, "Buck, a retired buckskin cow pony, gives a first person account of his life and times on the early range." (18 pp.), illustrated from photographs with verso of title page showing an image of Buell's business office in Stockton, California, and five photographic images of Buell's operation, one facsimile testimonial letter, and three charts and graphs. A 21 5/8' x 27 3/4" folding color map is tipped-in at the rear. Buell's firm founded in 1883, and in 1887 incorporated. It offered a plethora of lumber products & services, including processing from the time the tree was felled until milled & planed into usable lumber, which Buell obviously hoped would be purchased for any mining efforts in the area [e.g., one chart provides lumber measurements and a second distances from Stockton, where the mill located, to the divers mining areas]. Buell's map depicts area from Bouldin Island to Yosemite and from Amador County south to the Merced River, including railway routes, stagecoach lines, the mines themselves, flumes & county roads. OCLC lists 7 holdings, with the item somewhat uncommon in the trade, no copies ever having come to auction per RBH & ABPC. There is an unobtrusive 2" hairline split to a fold point of the map, else a very good plus copy. **\$1600.00**

Original tan muslin printed in black, 16mo, 483 pp. A few minor nicks to fragile binding, and some occasional minor staining to text, other than these minor flaws, a superb copy. Although the book first came out in black cloth, it is more rare in the printed muslin. Six Score 28 says "This classic of American literature contains the best account of the early hide trade in California. The author's ship stayed on the coast for over a year in 1835 and 1836, for the purpose of buying hides. Cattle were plentiful in California in this period, but there was no market for the surplus beef. Hence the industry revolved around hide and tallow trade." **Laid-in to this copy is a two-page letter, written in ink, dated July 2, 1850, and signed by Richard H. Dana, Jr.** Housed in a quarter leather and marbled paper over boards clam shell case, with raised bands and titles stamped in gold gilt on the spine. **\$4250.00**

Kurutz 314 says "Harris, in this long-winded paper, concentrates his words on California's geography, history, and potential. He downplays the effect of the gold discovery and emphasizes agriculture and commercial possibilities. He speaks of California's geographic position, the building of the transcontinental railroad, and its future as the gateway to the Orient. It would become, he predicted, the new Constantinople, or Lisbon." **\$125.00**

Much information about Yosemite to include Yosemite Valley, fruits, hotels, and distances to points of interest in and about Yosemite via carriage drives and trail trips. Other places described include the Sentinel Hotel, Lake Tenaya, several trips from one place to another within the Mariposa County; the Mariposa Estate or Fremont Grant which occupies a unique position in the mining history of the world. The mines include the Princeton which has been the largest producer on the Grant; the Mariposa which is best known for being discovered by Kit Carson, the scout,

Alexander Gody and James Duff in 1849; the Mount Ophir and the Pine Tree and Josephine. Information includes the city of Mariposa, its' public schools, livery stable, hotel, et. al.; the Coulterville Mining District, Merced Gold Mining Company, the Virginia Mine and the Reed Mines; the town of Bear Valley which is located in the center of a rich mining section with several mines; the town of Mount Bullion which changed its name to Princeton from the big mine that supports it; Cathey's Valley is a strip of Mariposa County, a large portion of which is farmed producing abundant crops and is also a fine fruit belt; the Quartzburg Mining District which is located on the western side of the county; the Hornitos Gold Mining Company; the East Belt Mines; the Diana Group; the Whitlock, Sherlock and Colorado mining section et. al. Also described are the forests of the Mariposa County. At Cherry Creek he encamped at Smith's trading post, then proceeded to the Cache la Poudre, and, during the winter, continued on to the head of Clear Creek. From thence, deciding to prospect the region, he followed up the Vasquez River to Grass Valley and Soda Creek and on to Chicago Creek. On the fateful day of January 5, 1859, he recorded in his journal: 'Moved up to next creek on south side . . . good gravel here; looks like it would carry gold. Wind has blown snow off rim, but gravel is hard frozen; panned out two cups; nothing but fine colors. June 6th: . . . Mountain lion came into camp; dogs killed him after I had broken his back with belt axe; h.l of a fight. June 7th: . . . Panned out eight treaty cups; found nothing but fine gold; Ninth cup got a NUGGET OF COARSE GOLD.' Thus crudely is raw history writ; uncouthly and without prescience. But in that 'ninth cup' with its 'nugget of coarse gold' was the lodestone which was to stampede a nation and populate a vast section of the Rocky Mountain Wilderness." In May of 1836, the carelessly defended Fort was attacked by an Indian party comprised of several hundred Comanches, Kiowas, and Kichais (Caddo). The Indians killed 5, and captured 9 year old Cynthia Ann Parker and 4 others. The Indians split up 6 days later and Cynthia Ann was taken by a Quahadi Comanche party beginning 25 years of life among the Comanches. At various times from 1840 through the 1850's Cynthia Ann was seen by various traders who all reported that she was happy and fully content living with the Comanches. During the 1840's she married Peta Nocona, a warrior who had led the attack on Fort Parker. Their marriage produced 2 sons and a daughter. One son, Quanah Parker became the last great Chief of the Comanche tribe. In December, 1860, Cynthia Ann was "rescued" when a Ranger force led by Sul Ross attacked a Comanche village at the Battle of Pease River. Cynthia Ann and her daughter were taken by the Rangers to Camp Cooper where they were held until they were positively identified by Cynthia Ann's uncle, Col. Issac Parker. For the next 10 years she lived a sad and miserable life of continual efforts by others to rehabilitate her into white frontier life. On numerous occasions Cynthia Ann tried to run away to rejoin her husband and sons, but was never successful. She died of influenza in 1870, weakened by self-imposed starvation. This visual offering begins with the Indian Thirty-Fifty, Model 540. The grouping of photos include the models and new features of each cycle available. Some have been airbrushed to delete the backgrounds and insure a faithful representation. These include the: Model 337-Standard Indian Y Chief; Model 637-Standard Sport Scout 45; Model 437-Sport Indian Four; Model 537-Indian Junior Scout; Model 237-Standard Indian Scout 45. Next are the photographs showing the special models for that year (with the above models being factory direct). They include; Indian Police Special Seventy-four; Police Special Indian Four; Indian Four (model 441 with four-cylinder air-cooled in-line engine"); Indian Chief Seventy-four (Model 341); Standard Body Indian Dispatch Car; Large Body Indian Dispatch Car; Indian Thirtyfifty (Model 540); Indian Sport Scout 45 (Model 641); Indian Thirty-fifty (Model 541); Side Van Commercial Indian Motorcycle; Indian Police Car; Indian Dispatch Tow Model DT-27; Indian Dispatch Tow Model DT-33; Indian Dispatch Tow Model DT-29, etc. The DT models are all three-wheel vehicles for either police use or delivery companies. Many of the remainder of the photographs show Indian Motorcycles in use, with numerous pictures of various police departments that had adopted Indians for their use. Some of the police departments include Denver Police Department, Oklahoma Highway Patrol, Iowa Highway Patrol, Illinois State Highway Maintenance Police, New York City Police, Pennsylvania State Highway Patrol. Massachusetts State Police. In the mid-30s Indian was in fierce competition with Harley-Davidson to provide police departments across the country with motorcycles. Also included are various transformations of the Dispatch Models including a fine one of a fleet of the custom built DTs for the Biltmore Florist of Los Angeles. There is also an armored Indian with armored side car (with two police officers seated and machine guns jutting out the front), another full page photograph of a fleet of armored motorcycles in Peru, and one racing photograph and one rally photograph. The "Indian Motorcycle Co.", represented visually herein by a birds-eye view of their factory in Springfield, MA, "was originally founded as the Hendee Manufacturing Company

by George M. Hendee in 1897, manufacturing bicycles. Carl Oscar Hedstrom joined in 1900. Both Hendee & Hedstrom were former bicycle racers and manufacturers, and they teamed up to produce a motorcycle with a 1.75 bhp, single-cylinder engine; this was accomplished in Hendee's home town of Springfield. The bike was successful and sales increased dramatically during the next decade. In 1901, a prototype and two production units of the diamond framed Indian Single were successfully designed, built & tested. The first Indian motorcycles, having chain drives and streamlined styling, were sold to the public in 1902. In 1903, Indian's co-founder and chief engineer Oscar Hedstrom set the world motorcycle speed record (56 mph). The Scout and Chief V-twins, introduced in the early 1920s, became the Springfield firm's most successful models. Designed by Charles B. Franklin, the middleweight Scout and larger Chief shared a 42-degree V-twin engine layout. Both models gained a reputation for strength and reliability. In 1930, Indian merged with DuPont Motors. DuPont Motors founder E. Paul DuPont ceased production of DuPont automobiles and concentrated the company's resources on Indian. Models of that era had Indian's famous head-dress logo on the gas tank. Indian's huge Springfield factory was known as the Wigwam, and native American imagery was much used in advertising. In 1940, Indian sold nearly as many motorcycles as its major rival, Harley-Davidson. At the time, Indian represented the only true American-made heavyweight cruiser alternative to Harley-Davidson." Indian's most popular models were the Scout, made from 1920 to 1946, and the Chief, made from 1922 to 1953. Unfortunately, the company went bankrupt in 1953. Today, the vintage cycle enjoys much popularity among enthusiasts, with models from the era displayed herein being offered for 5-figure sums. Modest wear to the portfolio spine. The final page contains a description of the Lawrence Coal Company, leading some to conclude they may have been behind the publication of this pamphlet. The town was apparently never built. Moffit located only the copy at the Library of Congress, and the American Imprints Inventory for Iowa added only the Boston Public Library and

Wisconsin Historical Society. OCLC adds Yale, Grinnell College, the Newberry Library, and the DeGolyer Library. Americana Exchange lists a copy offered by Goodspeeds in 1966 and none before or since. 





THE BOLDEST BANK ROBBERY ATTEMPT IN AMERICAN HISTORY

EIGHT MEN DEAD & SEVERAL OTHERS WOUNDED!

On the morning of October 5, 1892, Bob, Grat, & Emmett Dalton, along with fellow gang members Dick Broadwell & Bill Powers rode into Coffeyville, Kansas with ambitious plans to rob the C.M. Condon Co. Bank and the First National Bank...at the same time! Fortunately for him, gang member Bill Doolin was left behind due to his lame horse.

Although the Dalton Brothers had all briefly served as Deputy U.S. Marshal in Oklahoma & Kansas, shortly thereafter they had become notorious for cattle rustling and a variety of robberies, including several train robberies in 1891 & 1892. In addition to the Dalton Brothers, most other gang members got together while working as cowboys on Oscar Halsell's HX Bar Ranch in Oklahoma. Known to many Coffeyville citizens, the Dalton's wore disguises, but as they approached the banks they were recognized by some citizens and the alarm was spread. Emmett & Bob entered the First National Bank, while Grat & the other 2 entered the Condon Bank. With \$21,000 in a grain sack, Emmett & Bob left the First National Bank, but were immediately fired upon by several citizens. They headed out the back door into "Death Alley." Grat, told of a time-lock on the safe in the Condon Bank, was shot through the bank window, after which he grabbed \$1500 and fled with Dick & Bill into "Death Alley." Emmett Dalton, the "Sole Survivor" of the gang received a severe rifle shot wound to his arm, but despite the opportunity to escape, he returned into heavy gunfire to help Bob, when he received 21 buckshot from a citizen's double-barreled shotgun. Badly wounded, Emmett survived, refusing doctor's recommendations to amputate his arm. He received a life sentence in the Kansas State Penitentiary. In 1907, Emmett was pardoned by a petition from citizens of Coffeyville. He married his longtime sweetheart, moved to California, and in 1931 published When The Dalton's Rode, which subsequently became a movie. Emmett Dalton died in Los Angeles in 1937.

For the arrest of **REUBEN HOUSTON BURROWS**, and his delivery over to any member of **PINKERTON'S NATIONAL DETECTIVE AGENCY**, or any agent who is authorized to receive him on behalf of the State of Arkansas, and is the bearer of a requisition from the **GOVERNOR OF THAT STATE**.

Reuben Houston Burrows is charged with highway robbery, having, with his brother, James Buchanan Burrows, and others, on the night of **Friday, December 9, 1887**, boarded the north bound train on the St. Louis, Arkansas and Texas R. R. at Genoa Station, Ark., and compelled the messenger of the **SOUTHERN EXPRESS COMPANY** to surrender the keys of his safe. They then rifled the safe of \$3,500. All of the robbers wore masks. Since the robbery two of the men concerned in it **have been arrested**, one of them being **James Buchanan Burrows**.

In an attempt to arrest **Rube and Jim Burrows in Montgomery, Ala.**, on January 23, 1888, **James Burrows shot and fatally wounded Mr. Neil Bray**, a compositor on the **Advertiser**, who had been called on and was aiding the officer in his arrest.

The **BURROWS BROTHERS** were born and raised in **Lamar County, Alabama**. **JAMES BURROWS** has lived in Texas off and on, last time one year; principally in **Erath and Wise Counties**. He is married, and has a wife and three children.

DESCRIPTION OF REUBEN HOUSTON BURROWS:

Age, 32 years; height, 6 feet; weight, 160 pounds; blue eyes, which do not look full at person; round head, wears $7\frac{1}{2}$ hat; full forehead; broad face; short nose, pug order; swarthy or sandy complexion; light sandy hair; thin light moustache; uses Hair Vigor to darken hair; broad face under each ear, thin near the mouth; something of a lounging gait; when about town has hands in pockets in leisurely way; wears no jewelry; his left arm is a little shorter than right, caused by having it broken at bend of arm; does not smoke or chew; wears dark clothes and woolen shirts; is somewhat of a country story teller, relating snake, dog and cat fights, etc.; lived in Wise and Erath counties, Texas, 14 years; was born in Lamar county, Ala.; is married; has two children who are at his father's in Alabama; his wife at her father's, Mr. Hoover, at Alexandria; drinks, but does not get drunk; good horseman; don't gamble, but can play game of seven-up. Carries a 45-calibre pistol; is a good shot; has worked on the Mexican Central R. R., and is a member of the Masonic fraternity.

Transport Engineers with the A.E.F. during and after World War I. Article VI, Section 1 (page 24) reads: "The rights of citizens of the State of Wyoming to vote and hold office shall not be denied or abridged on account of sex. Both male and female citizens of this state shall equally enjoy all civil, political and religious rights and privileges." Wyoming was admitted to the Union on July 10, 1890. Both Utah and Washington quickly followed Wyoming's lead, but it would be another thirty years before women's suffrage was enacted at the federal level. This exceptional group offers an excellent historical record of the Carbon County Rodeo in Rawlins, Wyoming at the beginning of the 20th century. The riders depicted include such noted cowboy performers as Sam Brownell from Iron Mountain, who began per-

forming in the Frontier Days, Cheyenne, Wyoming in 1904; Roy "Skeeter Bill" Robbins (1887-1933) was a tall, active cowboy from Glenrock, Wyoming, who became a professional rodeo performer often performing in the East; and his brother Harry Robbins. Mark Frederick Jukes (1877-1971) immigrated to the United States from Canada at the beginning of the 20th century and established himself as a professional photographer in Rawlins, Wyoming, as well as working for the Rio Grande Railroad, becoming a pioneering photographer of early steam railroads in the West. He would later move his studio to Elko, Nevada by 1920, and by the 1930's had established himself in Bellingham, Washington where he would remain until his death in 1971. 



Centering around the Sons of the Pioneers, and their Lucky U Ranch Radio & Television shows based in Los Angeles, these images include such music celebrities as Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, June Carter, Ken Curtis, Hugh & Karl Farr, Tim Spencer, Bob Nolan, Shug Fisher, Chet Atkins, Lefty Frizzell, Hawkshaw Hawkins, Ann Jones, Judy Lynn, Lloyd Perrymann, Wade Ray, Hank Snow, Ernest Tubb, T. This extraordinary musical archive of privately printed fanzines, photographs, photograph albums, letters, clippings, records, and memorabilia offer invaluable historical visual & audio artifacts, documenting the passion of two young women for the Cowboy Western music scene surging from its' Southern California roots following World War II. Nellie Ferry (1912-1972), who worked in radio at KVAN, and other radio stations in Portland, and hosted radio interviews and shows for Country Western stars, and was head of the T. Texas Tyler fan club. Her husband Earnest V. Ferry (1907-1960) worked as a machinist for the Union Pacific, and also operated Ferry's Foto service which supplied photographs for Country Western fan clubs. Chapman (1930-1999) attended Milwaukee and Franklin High Schools, was an avid amateur photographer, aspired to be a reporter, and entered Lewis & Clark College in 1947, before founding the Shug Fisher Fan Club in Portland, OR, and became its President, and primary contact with the Sons of the Pioneers, and other cowboy western musical groups.
